Directions to Storrowton Tavern, West Springfield, MA.

Storrowton Tavern is on the Big E (Eastern States Exposition) grounds, near Gate 2.

To reach Gate 2, **using GPS, enter 1535 Memorial Ave, West Springfield, MA,** or "Big E Gate 2," but NOT 1305 Memorial Ave (the business address on their website and Google search result).

From the North

Take I-91 South to exit 13B, to Rte. 5 South, to Rte. 147 West (Memorial Avenue) to Big E grounds Gate 2 (about 1.6 miles on the left).

From the South

Take I-91 North to Mass. Exit 3, to Rte. 5 North, to Rte. 147 West (Memorial Avenue) to Big E grounds Gate 2 (about 1.6 miles on the left).

Enter through Gate 2 and continue straight on the Avenue of States (with parking on both sides). Storrowton Tavern will soon be seen on the left. Walk through the wooden arch with Storrowton Tavern sign above; follow the brick path around the side of the building to the main entrance.

COINCIDENCES IN WALES

Coincidence: "a remarkable concurrence of events or circumstances without apparent casual connection. Synonyms: accident, chance, serendipity, fate, destiny, providence."

Several occurrences on our recent trip to Wales fell into this category. In fact, almost every day we six were reminded what a small world this is and how we are all connected by only 6 degrees of separation.

Each of us traveled to the land of our roots with hopes, if not expectations. And each of us was rewarded in many ways.

On our first full day, it had been agreed to visit Rhosllanerchrugog in search of Mary Jones Pallos' father's birthplace, and visiting the Penuel chapel where her grandfather had been choir director for several years. While we were at the Miners' Institute, at which we'd stopped on a whim, a couple joined us and they were introduced as Myrddin and Perry Davies, members of the Penuel chapel. Introductions were made all around while Mary explained her reasons for being there. She checked her phone and showed Perry a number and asked if she knew who that was. Perry's response, "Why do you have our number in your phone?" At which point Mary explained that she has their whole family tree in her phone because her sister-in-law has been best friends with their niece Janice since college. At this point it was discovered the two families were connected! I think we all cried with her. They took us to the Chapel where we chatted for over an hour, then to their lovely home for tea and home-made Bara Brith. Another coincidence in this small world.

Upon arriving at "The Corwen Old Police Station," our first AirB&B, we were greeted by our hosts. Before they left, they suggested we visit one of the local pubs, The Harp, as Phil the publican is interested in people outside of Wales who are learning the language. So, after dinner on our second night we walked down the main street to visit Phil in the Harp. After taking our orders, Phil asked where were all from. That question led to him telling us he has a cousin who lives in New York state. Well, since Beth Roberts Brown grew up in Granville, New York, she asked where. Bronwyn lives in Ithaca, says Phil. Bronwyn Quirk, Beth and Sue asked? Yes, do you know her? Yes,

we met at NAFOW a few years ago and have been in touch ever since. Smaller world!

On our way from Corwen to Conwy we stopped for lunch at the Cross Foxes



pub and met up with Beth Roberts Brown's cousin Sue and her husband Joe. After introductions, it was discovered that cousin Sue was born in the same nursing home in Colwyn Bay as was our Susan Davies Sit,

and that she had lived in Colwyn Bay where her father was a policeman. Small world!

Susan Jenkins Meers and Paul Edwards became acquainted through Terry Davies, author of two books on the Marine Families and Boating history of Borth, Wales. Terry, who is a subscriber and contributor to NINNAU, saw a picture of Susan in an issue of NINNAU. He connected the Jenkins name with a very old family of mariners in Borth, and knew that Paul Edwards was connected to the same family. So, he contacted Paul, telling him he thought he might have found a cousin of his in the United States, and put them in touch. They share 2x great grandparents, David (b.1788) and Elinor Williams (b.1790) Jenkins. And now they share a very rich history and love of the seaside village of Borth. They had a wonderful visit and lunch with Terry and his wife Mandy, and were able to thank him in person for acting on that hunch. What makes this so special is that Susan has two Jenkins lines, and the one she carries is her maiden name which comes from the mining valleys of south Wales.

Not only is Paul Edwards of Upper Colwyn Bay cousin to Susan Jenkins Meers, but he and his wife, Jane, started their married life in Mochdre, and spent many fun and satisfied evenings round the corner at the Mountain

View Pub, which at that time was managed by Susan Davies Sit's parents, lan and Betty Davies. He recalled how proud Ian was when they renovated the pub and had had a new stainless steel kitchen installed. Ian had given Paul a tour of the kitchens. Paul and Jane now live just a few miles away over the hill, and have very fond memories of Sue's dad and mom. Paul also is no

stranger to Mary's Rhosllanerchrugog, as he had lived there over the post office as a boy while his father was postmaster. Coincidences galore!

One of the highlights of our trip was getting to spend time at the National

Eisteddfod, held in Llanrwst this year. We had volunteered to spend time in the WNAA tent, and as

Susan Davies Sit was volunteering there, a gentleman walked in with his elderly mother. He proceeded to tell Susan about an article he had recently read in NINNAU about a woman who was researching her ancestors in the small town of Llandyfrydog on Angelsey where his mother was born and still lives. He was very surprised when Sue identified herself as the author of that article. This resulted in an offer of hospitality whenever Sue returns for more research, including a tour of the village and a visit to the farm, Ynys Fawr, where her 3 x great grandfather had lived.

What are the chances: our group was listening to local Brynmawr historian, Eifion Davies, as we toured chapels and limestone and iron ore mines in the area. Beth Roberts Brown was shown a music CD called The Boy From the Top of the Hill, which Eifion had been involved in crafting and as she looked at the musician names on the CD jacket, she sees a familiar name. She asked Eifion if Huw Williams was a local performer, as she knew a Welsh musician and clogger called Huw Williams who was part of the folk group Crasdant. Beth had seen the group at NAFOW years ago and again at a Welsh folk night in Utica, NY. Huw Williams is also the father of Bethan Williams and manager of her dynamic Welsh group Calan that Beth has seen in concert

and met at festivals here in the USA. Could he be the same Huw Williams? Eifion's expression confirmed he was the very same.

Two of my over-used sayings in life are "why?" And "I don't understand". Then I remember we're not called to understand, but we are called to receive. And when we are willing to receive and accept with open minds and hearts, amazing things happen.
